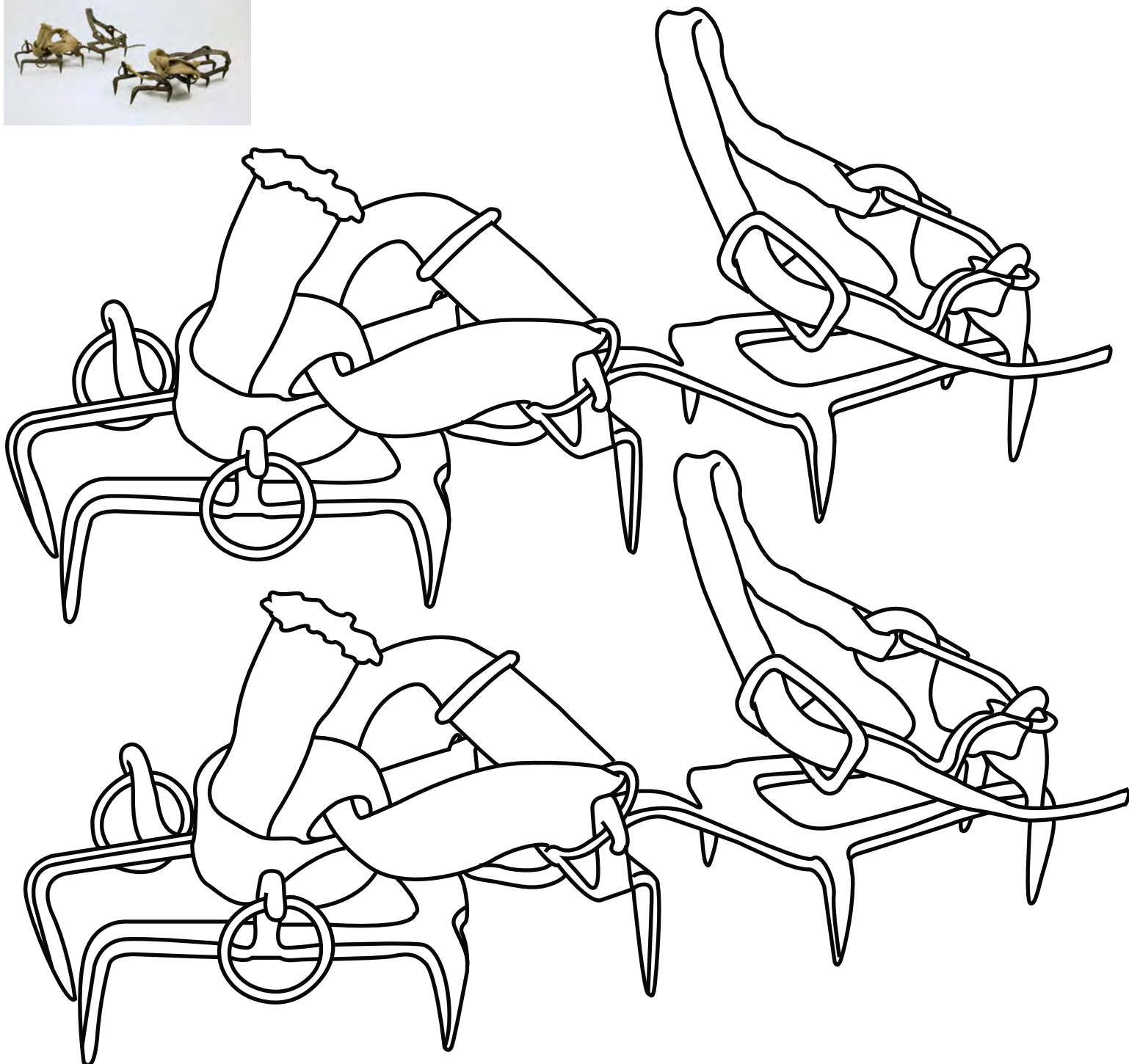


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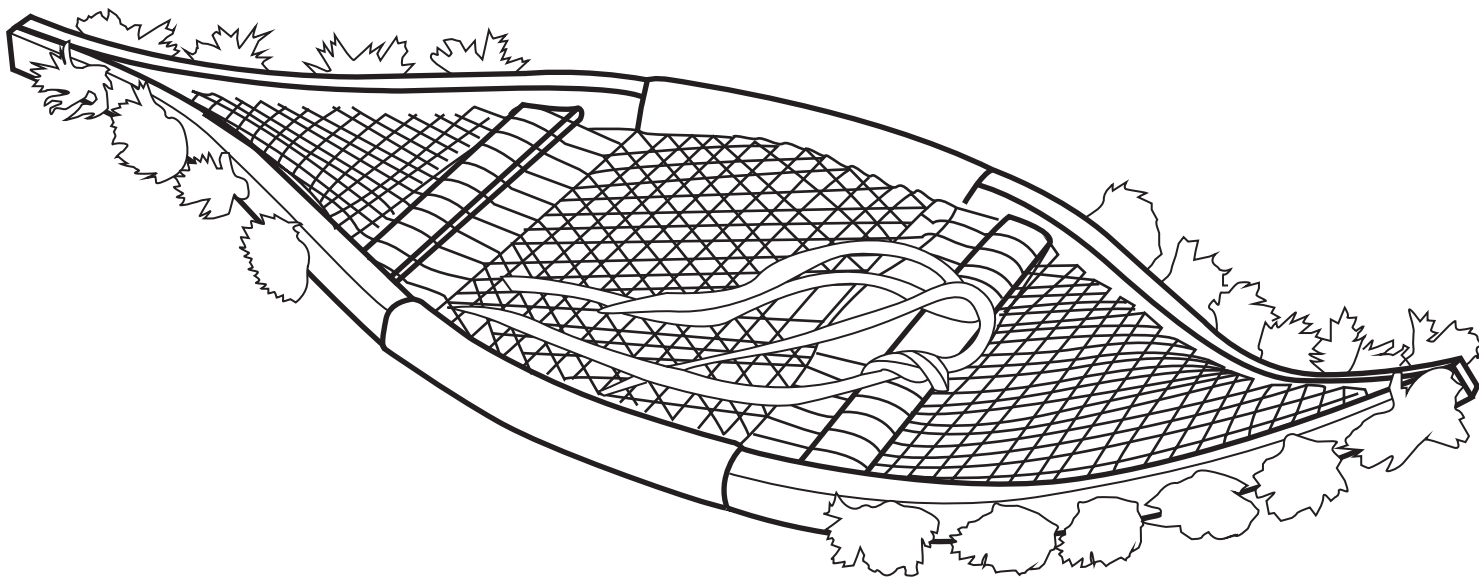
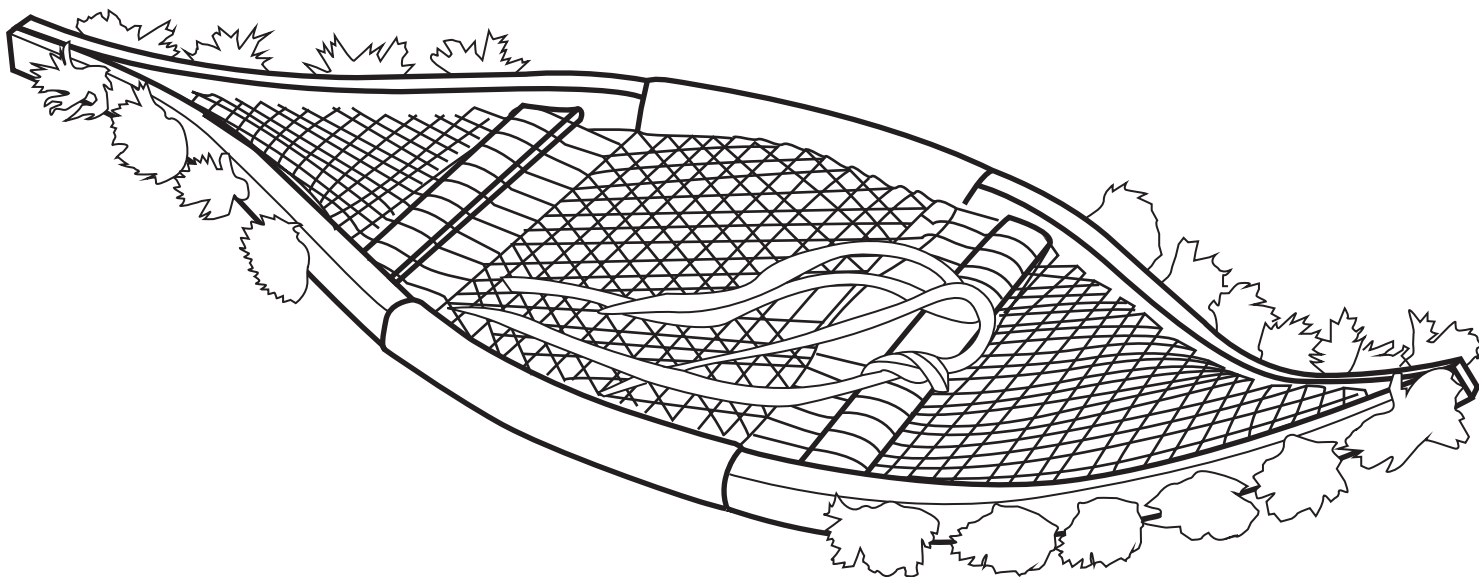


These crampons date from the early to mid-20th century and feature sharp metal spikes as the sole. When attached to a pair of boots, they would have provided traction for walking or climbing cold and icy surfaces.

NORTH AMERICAN • C. 1900-1950

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This mini snowshoe features a two-piece wooden frame and netting in a hexagonal weave pattern through the centre. Measuring 20 cm long and featuring little pompoms around the frame, it was likely created as a decorative piece and may have been sold as a tourist good.

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
